# **Accomplishments & Highlights**

- Participated in the Vermont Rural Water Association Apprenticeship Program
- Purchased and installed replacement parts for dewatering press
- Purchased new water meters
- Completed 20-year Wastewater Treatment Facility Study

# **Accomplishments & Highlights**

- Prepared for and responded to two floods
- Purchased new monitoring system for water system
- Repaired backwash pump
- Cleaned solids out of all holding tanks with the exception of aeration Tank 2 which will be cleaned in spring/summer 2024

# **Accomplishments & Highlights**

- Received the following awards from Green Mountain Water Environment Association:
  - Michael J. Garofano Water Operator of the Year Award: Steve Cote
  - Bob Wood Young Professionals Award: Brad Snow
  - Facility Excellence Award for Water: **Richmond Water Resources**
  - Facility Excellence Award for Wastewater: Richmond Water Resources

- Operational spending increasing by \$20,150 for Water; and \$23,926 in Wastewater
- Revenue
  - The Fund Balance / Unrestricted Funds are not utilized in the budget, but some capital costs are coming from unrestricted funds and reserves.
  - Decrease in use of Septage revenue from \$550,000 in FY24 to \$500,000 in FY25

- Revenue (continued)
  - Increase in Interest Revenue
    - From \$6,000 to \$11,100 in Water
    - From \$14,000 to \$25,900 in Wastewater

- Notable increases in Water and Wastewater included
  - Increase in health insurance due change in staffing resulting in change in healthcare programs selected

- Notable increases in Water include
  - Increased contribution to Water Capital Reserve from \$0 to \$10,000
- Notable increases in Wastewater include
  - Added a line for Contracted Operators to pay for licensed Wastewater Operator at \$41,340
- Notable decreases in Wastewater include
  - Reduced Biosolids Chemicals from \$98,100 to \$70,000
  - Reduced Biosolids Disposal from \$160,000 to \$150,000

- Water Unrestricted Funds:
  - End of FY23 Balance: \$183,780
  - Uses in FY24 Total \$87,840
    - Water Meter Purchase: \$57,840
    - Water System Alarm System: \$15,000
    - Borden St. Shut Off: \$15,000
  - Projected end of FY24 Balance of \$95,940
  - Recommended to keep at least 15% of the next budget in unrestricted funds. Projected balance is 24% of FY25 Budget.

- Wastewater Unrestricted Funds:
  - End of FY23 Balance: \$366,236
  - Uses in FY24 Total \$128,566
    - December flood recover: \$55,725
    - Water Meter Purchase: \$57,840
    - Clean aeration tanks: \$15,000
  - Projected end of FY24 Balance of \$237,671
  - Recommended to keep at least 15% of the next budget in unrestricted funds. Projected balance is 27% of FY25 Budget.

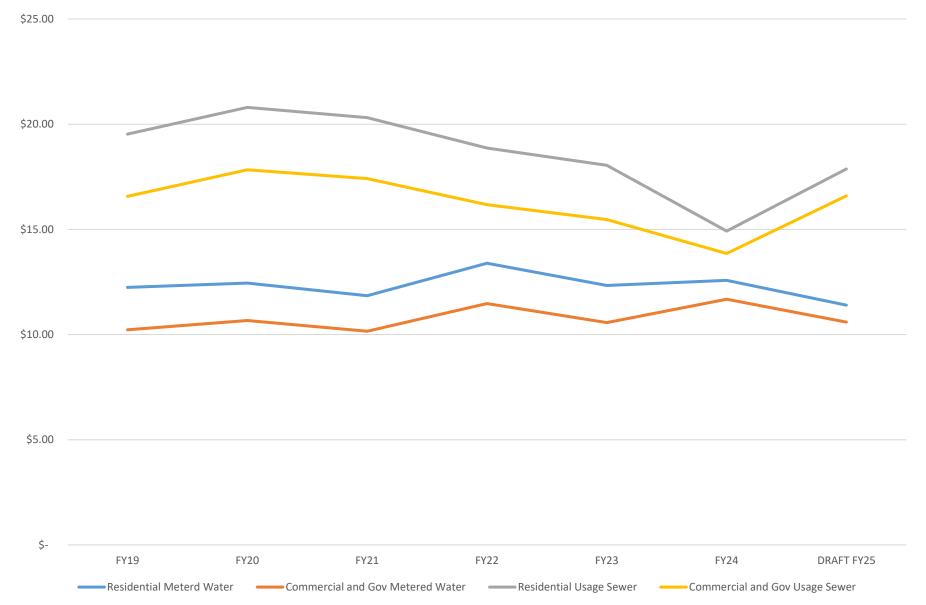

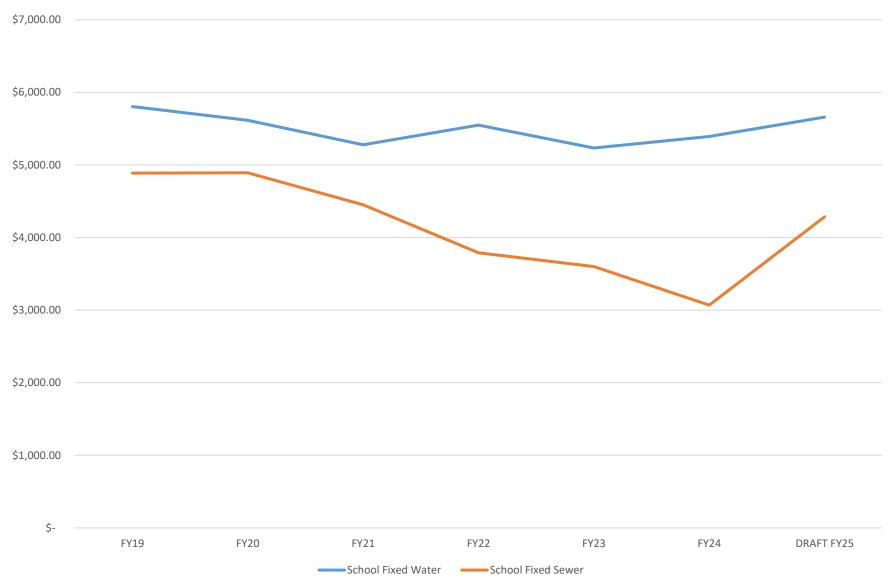

#### **Residential and Commercial Fixed Rate**

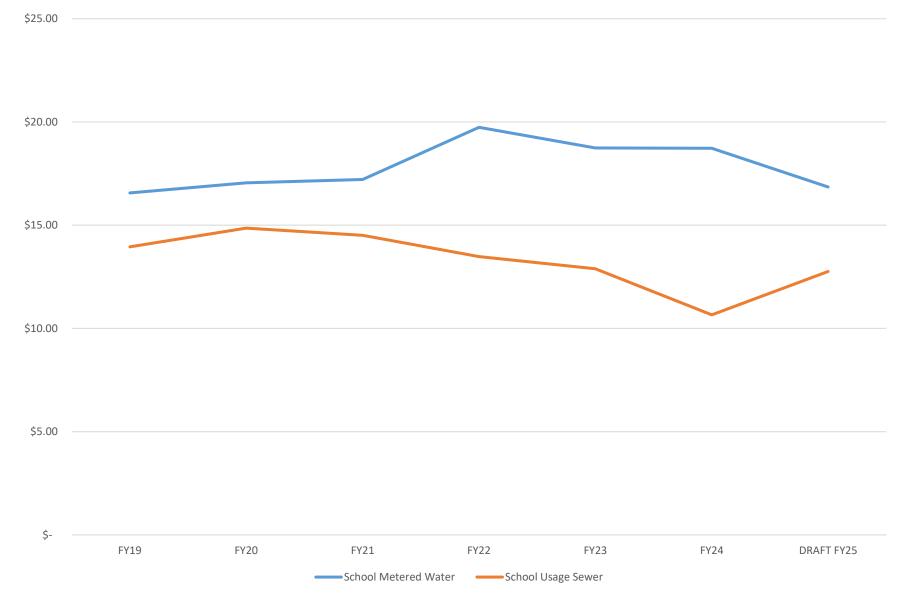
#### **Residential and Commercial Metered/Usage Rate**



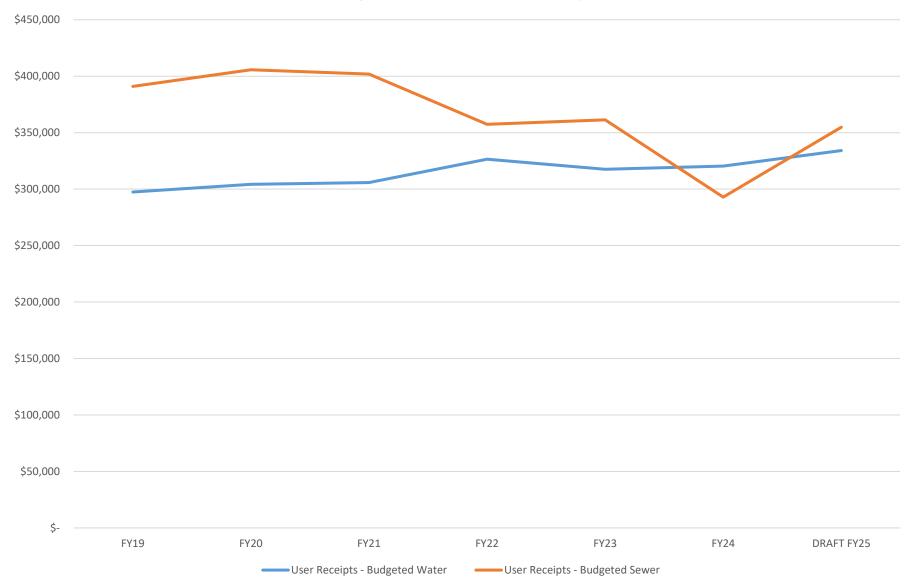
#### **School Fixed Rate**



#### School Metered/Usage Rate

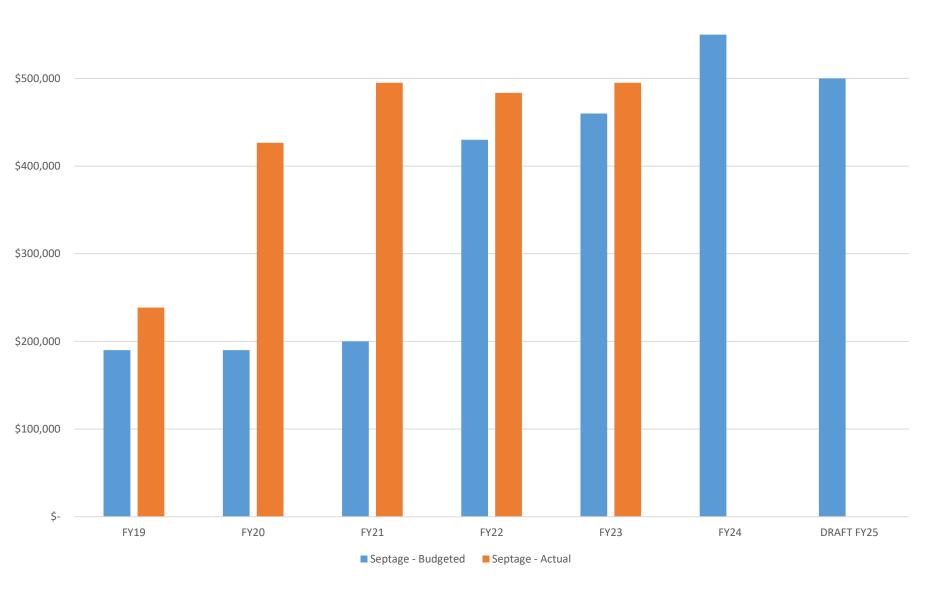


#### **Budgeted User Receipts**

## **Near-Term Projects**

- Next steps in 20 Year Wastewater Treatment Facility upgrade
- Installation of water meters
- Installation of new influent pump
- Clean grit from aeration Tank #2
- Tilden Ave., Bridge St., Cochran Rd. Waterline Replacement estimated at \$1,808,000

## **Projects Under Discussion**

 The Gateway Sewer and Water Expansion projects continues to be discussed by the Water and Sewer Commission.

Impacts to the Water & Sewer Budget from capital projects

- 2006 Treatment Plant Upgrades totaling \$3,740,000
  - Repayment of \$348,378 after subsidy.
  - \$22,220 per year. Final payment in 2026
- 2010 Sewer Lining & Manholes totaling \$445,999
  - Repayment of \$222,999 after loan subsidy at 2% interest.
  - \$14,093 per year. Final payment in 2032
- 2011 Jericho Road totaling \$941,200
  - Repayment at variable rate, decreasing over time
  - \$62,041 budgeted for FY25 between water and wastewater. Final payment in 2032

- 2018 RFL 101 planning totaling \$120,810 at 0% interest.
  - \$12,081 per year. Final payment in 2027
- 2016 East Main Street totaling \$1,275,000
  - Repayment at approximately \$25,140 per year, after subsidy. Final payment in 2047

- 2020 Bridge St. waterline replacement project, (upper Bridge St. and bridge crossing) totaling \$789,228
  - 50% subsidy on the bond
  - Payments are \$9,865 per year. Final payment in 2060
- 2022 Bridge St. waterline replacement project (middle section) totaling 400,000
  - 75% subsidy on the bond
  - Payments are \$2,500 per year. Final payment in 2062

- 2014/15 Water Storage Tank & Chlorine Project
  - \$1,575,000 bond at -0.7% interest in the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF); \$37,705 per year. This was a negative interest loan but has been restructured to reduce the principal and subsequent payments to achieve the same reduced payback. Final Payment in 2048.
  - \$181,000 GAP loan to cover the portion not eligible for the DWSRF program. \$26,350 per year. Final payment in 2025.

### Open Seats on the Water and Sewer Commission

- Two one-year terms on the Water and Sewer Commission are reserved for customers of the Water and Sewer System
- These seats are appointed by the Selectboard
- Letters of interest are due to the Town Manager by June 1, 2024
